Foreword

My husband has officiated at more weddings than we have kept track of, but I believe last time his secretary counted, and throwing in the ones since then, it was closing in on a hundred. I've attended most of those weddings, as well as many of the rehearsals and rehearsal dinners. I've even played the part of "go girl" many times.
